# EDITORIAL.

"Warre or battel as a thinge very beastelye, and yet to no kynde of beastes in so muche use as it is to man, they do detest and abhorre. They never goo to battayle, but other in the defence of their own countreye, or to drybe oute of their frendes lande the enemyes that be comen in, or by their powre to deliver from the yocke and bondage of tyrannye some people that be oppressed with tyranny. Whyche thynge they doo of mere pytge and compassion."

Perhaps no more complete exposition of the motives with which England entered the Great War could be found

than is contained in the quaint, majestic phrases of the old XVIth Century philosopher. This voice from the dead, which spoke in an age when national rapacity was not only rampant but universally admired as a virtue, has a poignant meaning for us to-day. The prophecy, which was then only conceivable as applied to the visionary Utopians, is today fulfilled in our ears. We have gone to war in defence of our country, to drive out of our friends' land the enemies that have invaded it, and by our power to deliver an oppressed people from the The yoke and bondage of tyranny. completeness of the realisation of More's ideal gives us great hope for the future realisation of ideals which to-day are stigmatised as "Utopian."

Yet, while fully realising the ideals which led us into war, we must not be carried away by war to the extent of nullifying those very ideals. War, with whatever motive it be waged, has a degrading moral effect on the belligerents. It is apt to degenerate into war for its own sake. We must always regard ' war or battle as a thing very beastly.' It is a means to a noble end, but when it is exalted into an end in itself it becomes a Juggernaut, destructive not only of the physical, but of the whole moral wealth of a nation.

# ROLL OF HONOUR.

### KILLED IN ACTION.

Edward Geoffrey White, who was a Private in the 9th Battalion, 3rd Brigade, of the Australian Mediterranean Expeditionary Force, was killed in action in Gallipoli, on July 6th. Born on August 15th, 1892, he entered the School in September, 1906, and left in April, 1910. After leaving School he went to Australia and settled in Queensland, where in a short time he had come to be looked upon as a leading citizen and successful fruit grower. He was made a Justice of the Peace at the unprecedented age of twenty-one years and six months. He came to Egypt with the first Australian Contingent last Autumn and took part in the historic landing at Anzac Cove on April 25th of this year, being actually in the first boat to land. He was wounded some days later and was sent back to Egypt, but after his recovery he returned again to Gallipoli.

Ian Maclean Wilson, who was a 2nd Lieutenant in the Yorkshire Regiment, was killed in action at Suvla Bay on the Gallipoli Peninsula on August 6th. Born on May 25th, 1895, he entered the School in January, 1911, and left in July, On leaving School he went into 1912. Engineering works, and later attended Leeds University for one year. Нe passed his first examination for the B.Sc. in Engineering just before War broke out. He was gazetted on August 26th, 1914. to the 6th Batt. Yorkshire Regiment and was promoted Lieutenant in June of this year. He went out with the 13th Division to the Dardanelles in July. His battalion was landed at Suvla Bay about 9 p.m. on the night of August 6th as a covering party and ordered to take the small hill of Lala Baba. Within a short distance of the shore they came upon a trench full of Turks, and it was here that he fell at the head of his men.

Edward Clement Andrews, who was a Private in the New Zealand Expeditionary Force, was killed in action on August 8th on the Gallipoli Peninsula. Born on October 19th, 1880, he entered the School in January, 1890, and left in December, 1895. On leaving School he entered the Merchant Service, where he served for several years. Later he settled down in business in New Zealand at Lyttleton. When the War broke out he joined the 3rd Auckland Regiment in which he occupied the post of Signalling Instructor.

Alfred Lancelot Holland, who was a Private in the 7th Battalion, 2nd Brigade, of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, was killed in action in Flanders on September 25th. Born on June 15th, 1890. he entered the School in January, 1906. and left in December, 1907. After leaving School he went for a year to the Crystal Palace School of Engineering, and afterwards went out to Canada, where he settled down on Vancouver Island. He was out there five years and, soon after the War broke out, he enlisted in the 2nd Canadian Contingent. He came to England with them in March and, after spending some weeks in training at Shorncliff, he left for France on May 2nd. On September 20th, after making a feint attack in the morning, the Germans bombarded them in the afternoon, and he was killed by a shell which burst right in the trench.

### FROM THE FRONT.

"As I have read with great interest several letters from O.G.'s at present serving, I thought I would write about the Gallipoli Campaign, as everyone seems to be in Flanders.

Out here the fighting is very different. We have just effected a new landing, and on the Peninsula we have no luxurious 'dug-outs,' no A.S.C. to bring us a variety of food, no letters, mails, or papers. Nothing seems to reach us. and we, at present, have to live on 'bully' beef and very hard biscuits. To drink we delight in drinking very muddy water, that leaves a sediment in your mouth, making you even more thirsty. It is appallingly hot by day, and bit-terly cold during the night. In spite of these odds we have advanced several miles, and are very well established. In a few days I expect things will be working very well. I have just heard that Snelling is close by with the R.A.M.C. We have suffered rather badly, and have lost several officers and a great number of men. Snipers painted green effect big losses among the officers. A few days ago, a woman sniper was actually found, and she had fourteen identity discs round her neck; presumably she had crawled out at night and taken them off her victims! I am now using my machine guns to clear the trees of them. I had great difficulty in getting the guns up at all, as we have no transport, and everything at present is carried by ĥand."

"My experience of actual fighting has been very brief; I only got one morning of it before I was hit. Our battalion stayed a month on the Island of Lemnos, digging wells, making roads and piers, and generally preparing it as a base. We went to Anzac on August 4th. They started the big attack, and the landing of troops at Suvla Bay a few days later. We were in reserve until the 8th, and then we got in the thick of it. At the end of the day we had five officers left out of twenty-three. Several other batta-


lions of the 13th Division were equally badly cut up. I got a little burst of machine gun fire, sending one bullet through one leg, and two together through the other, fracturing both bones. Our artillery support was all given by naval guns from destroyers and monitors. It is very effective, I believe; but they cannot keep in touch with the infantry like Field Artillery, which may account for the heavy casualties. We got a splendid view of the Suvla Bay advance from our position, which was on very high ground. We did not have a very luxurious time at Gallipoli; nothing but bully, biscuit, jam, and a very limited supply of brackish water. It was not safe to light fires, so we had no hot tea, while I was there. One difficulty is that there are no roads, only dried-up watercourses, which are very narrow. Secondly, the beaches are, or were, all shelled occasionally; we had no transport there except a few pack mules, and they get in the way very much. The whole place swarms with snipers, who paint their faces green, and are very difficult to find. One is not safe from snipers even two or three miles behind the fire trenches." T. N. B.

"Some weeks ago, while wandering around the remains of Neuve Chapelle, I found the school. On top of a pile of books I found one small volume which treated Physics in a very oldfashioned way. It had no date, but was written by M. M. Drincourt and Dupays. Amongst other old friends, I found 'Le Marmite de Papin' and 'Principe D'Archimède.' I am in charge of a There is a line of keeps all along this keep. front. They are about 500 yards apart, and 500 yards behind the firing line. They are fortified for an all-round defence, and are expected to hold the enemy up if he takes our first two lines of trenches. For this purpose there is a store of three days rations for the garrison of 25. The orders are to hold on till the last man. Luckily, the Germans don't know of our existence, so we only get stray shells. Curiously enough, they have just put two within ten yards of the parapet. Anyhow, this is a very interesting life. It is very interesting to study the different types of men we have in the Regiment, and, if tired of them, we are always near the Highland Light Infantry, who all go by the name of 'Jock.' There are also the 1/1st Gurkhas and the 27th Punjabis. On our left now are the 40th Pathans, commonly called the '40 Thieves.' These nations differ greatly, and all have their food laws. They are a very jolly lot altogether."

### G. D. H. A.

"We have just come back after our first real encounter with the Germans, after six months

of trenches. We helped to capture the village of -; I expect you know which one. On Friday, Sept. 24th, we marched up from a town about five miles from the line, to a village, or what was once a village, a few hundred yards from the firing line. Early on Saturday morning, before it was light, we moved up to our most advanced trench, which was all ready prepared for us, scaling ladders in position. This was somewhere about 3 a.m. We sat there without anything happening till nearly six, when the Germans found out that an attack was coming off, and started bombarding us for all they were worth. They had been saving ammunition for this, as they had not replied to our bombardment, which had been going on for several days before. At 6.30 we got the order to get out. We all lay down till everyone was ready, and then we went off. The first two lines had been already taken by another battalion, who had charged a minute or two before us, so these didn't worry us. We had to go on past them over open fields for over half-a-mile, when we came to the right hand (or south end) of the village. We had to clear this and then push on up a slope the other side. The Germans from the beginning offered very little resistance, as our artillery bombardment seemed to have completely shattered their nerves. They just dropped their rifles and ran. The village, which we thought would be a tough job, turned out much easier than we expected, as they took to the cellars, and a bomb in each of these put an end to them. We captured a lot of prisoners, our battalion alone getting over 150. After the village was finished with, we went on up to the top of the slope, where we had to stop owing to the others on our right and left not having progressed as quickly. Our advance from beginning to end only took half-an-hour, for a gain of about a mile-and-a-half. I think the success of the whole affair was due greatly to the speed with which it was carried through. However, when we had to stop, the Germans had time to collect their senses and come back, taking up a position just in front. Our losses were not very heavy considering all things, but they lost very heavily. In one small wood the place was literally carpeted with them. Of course, I am only speaking of a small part of the line, only a few hundred yards in extent. We do not yet know exactly what happened on other parts of the attack, but from what we have seen and heard since they seem to have put up a better fight. Where we were they seemed to be only too glad to give themselves up. Sometimes 20 or 30 would give themselves up to one man. They left any amount of equipment and ammunition lying about. Our batitalion captured two guns, both of them very antiquated. After the actual attack, we stayed

there for three days, strengthening our position, etc. Our artillery was magnificent: we have never seen anything like it. As we advanced, they lengthened their range, always keeping a safe distance in front of us; also any attempt to shell us was promptly stopped."

# ANNUAL INSPECTION.

The Corps was inspected on Monday, July 26th, by Lt.-Col. Lombe, Norfolk Regiment, who reported as follows :---

Cadets were very steady during Inspection. Arms were very fairly handled, interval and distances were well kept and marching was good. Cadets appeared to have quite good knowledge of simple drill. March past was decidedly good, cadets carried out without hesitation every command given. While each platoon was being drilled, the others were questioned by Captain Renwick, who accompanied me; that officer reports that considerable intelligence and knowledge was displayed.

Manœuvre was very intelligently carried out, on wild open forest country. The boys were perfectly under control, sights were generally carefully adjusted. Fire direction intelligently worked. Cadets were specially good in taking advantage of cover and spared no pains in doing so. Flank and counter-attacks well arranged. Much individual intelligence displayed. There was rather too much talking, which tended to disclose the whereabouts of scouts, etc.

Discipline appeared to me to be universally good during parade and manœuvre, and I was informed that there is never any difficulty in maintaining it.

Turn out generally very good, and pains are evidently taken to make it so. State of clothing is good, but the fit leaves something to be desired.

Arms were in fairly good order. Equipment not complete, but well kept.

# THE CHAPEL.

Since our last issue the Chapel has been completed on the outside and all the scaffolding removed, so that one is beginning to get a much better idea of what it will ultimately look like externally. The hedge along the east side of the cricket field is being taken down and the appearance of the building is very much enhanced thereby, as prior to its removal the West Front gave one the impression of being somewhat buried. The work inside the building has been going on rather slowly owing to the difficulty of obtaining labour at the works at Stamford. The oak doors, which were put in during the holidays, have met with universal commendation. The two main doors are decorated with some very attractive iron work. The one at the porch has the words

# " Fiat Voluntas Tua"

inscribed upon it. These words have been found in another part of England in conjunction with the Gresham Arms, and it is thought that they are very probably the Gresham motto. The west door has the following inscription taken from I. Peter ii. 17:—

# " Honorate Omnes, Fruternitatem Diligete, Deum Timete, Regem Honorificate."

The organ gallery has just been completed, and is another striking success. The combination of oak and plaster is very pleasing, and the whole produces a fine effect on entering by the Porch. Facing one there is, at present, a specimen stained glass window by Messrs. Clayton and Bell with four lights, depicting Sir John and Lady Gresham in two of the lights, and their coats-of-arms in the other two. Much of the flooring, which consists of oak blocks, is in position and the ten main stalls have recently arrived. These contain some splendid oak, and we are inclined to think that the oak fittings of the chapel are likely to be very fine when they are completed.

At the end of last term serious hopes were entertained that the Chapel could be used for the holding of Confirmation on November 4th, but the unavoidable delay caused in the making of the seats has rendered this impossible. It is unlikely now that the building will be used before January. The organ builders were averse to removing the organ this autumn, and it is probable that the removal will not take place until the Easter holidays. In this case the singing during the first term will be unaccompanied, which, we understand, will not only be a severe test, but a very good training for the Choir.

As one visits the Chapel daily and sees the oak, which has already been put in, and compares it with the whitewashed walls adjoining, one's desire to see the whole of the woodwork completed grows more intense, and one welcomes, therefore, with delight the effort that is being made by the Old Boys to provide an important section of the seating, an account of which appears elsewhere in our issue.

### O.G. NEWS.

An O.G., who met E. G. White in Egypt after he had been sent back there wounded from Gallipoli, wrote as follows about him:—

"He was in the first boat of the first ladding party of the Australian Contingent, and was one of the first ashore. He seems to have fought with great gallantry. Wounded in the leg, he still carried on, and not until his right arm was damaged by shrapnel did he fall out of the actual firing line. He was still able to walk and had the use of his left arm, so devoted his energy to supplying ammunition. On his last journey back he came upon a man with half his foot blown off, so, throwing him on his shoulder, he carried him back to the hospital, a distance of two miles. He was so exhausted then by his great efforts and wounds that the Red Cross people would not let him return, but put him into the transport with the other wounded."

One of his greatest wishes was to revisit his old School, for which he shewed his love in letters both before the War and from Egypt and the Dardanelles.

The following is an extract from a letter received from a fellow-officer of I. M. Wilson:—

"We made a new landing last Friday, taking Lala Baba at the point of the bayonet. Not a shot was fired from leaving the boat to the final capture of the hill.

The 6th Yorks. and the West Yorks. were the first to leave the boats, and acted as a covering party to the rest of the Division. Both covered themselves with glory, and it was in the taking of the hill that we had most of our casualties. The men were simply splendid.

You would be sorry to hear about Wilson. He died bravely leading his men up to the attack of Lala Baba. He fell just in front of the top trench on the hill, and, from what I can make out, must have died practically instantaneously. He was a nice fellow, and his platoon was very cut up at losing him. I heard one of his men say that he was a little hero, and led his men splendidly."

D. A. Rutherford and D. A. Carnegie go to Woolwich, October 27th, and H. A. Boxall, J. H. C. Wooldridge, and R. H. Whitehead are at Sandhurst.

C. A. Hill has gone to the Royal Naval College, Keyham, near Devonport.

O. S. D. Wills has been seconded for work with the Army Signal Service.

M. C. Clayton has been appointed Adjutant of the 31st Cambridgeshire Regiment.

R. L. Carr is engaged upon munition work in London.

W. T. K. Braunholtz is working as an Orderly at the Cambridge Red Cross Hospital.

F. P. R. Nichols has been appointed Adjutant to the 39th Divisional Train, A.S.C.

J. H. Cole is attached to the Intelligence Department of the General Staff in Gallipoli.
