KILLED IN ACTION.

GEOFFREY RAVENSCOURT BARRATT
was a 2nd Lieutenant in the Lancashire

Fusiliers. Born on March 8th, 1891, he entered the School in September, 1905, and left in July, 1907. On leaving School he spent a year at Godesberg on the Rhine and, on his return to England, went into the cotton business in Lancashire, joining the Fine Cotton Spinners' Association at Bolton. When war broke out he at once obtained a commission in the Lancashire Fusiliers, and went to the Front in July, 1915. He was reported missing on July 7th, 1916, in the Battle of the Somme, and recently has been officially reported as killed in action on that date.

LEON ASHER SOMAN, who was a Lieutenant in the Norfolk Regiment was attached to the Loyal North Lancashire Regiment. Born on June 30th, 1890, he entered the School in September, 1902, and left in August, 1907. On leaving School he went to Germany for a year, and, after being in business in Norwich for a short time, he went out to Canada. When war broke out he was near Calgary, where he joined the Army with the first men of the famous 10th Battalion. With them he went as a private to France in February, 1915, but soon returned to England to take up a commission; he was gazetted to the Norfolk Regiment. He was sent out in December, 1915, with a draft of the Loyal North Lancashires and was in the Mesopotamian campaign from that time throughout all its trying vicissitudes. He was Acting Captain and Adjutant for some time, and was recently gazetted Lieutenant and Adjutant. He was killed in action on the Tigris on March 9th.

FREDERICK CLOETE WALKER was a Flight Sub-Lieutenant in the Royal Naval Air Service. Born on April 21st, 1898, he entered the School in May, 1912, and left in July, 1915. On leaving School he became a pupil for a Mechanical Engineering Course in the Works of the Central Electric and St. James' and Pall Mall Electric Supply Companies. In June, 1916, he was appointed a probationary Flight Sub-Lieutenant in the R.N.A.S., and in due course he obtained his pilot's certificate. He left for France in the early part of February and met his death on March 17th through his engine failing. He was buried in Aubigny Communal Cemetery, north west of Arras.

DAVID ALEXANDER CARNEGIE was a 2nd Lieutenant in the Royal Field Artillery. Born on January 15th, 1897, he entered the School in September, 1910, and left in July, 1915. He was a School Prefect and Captain of his House. He had passed into King's College, Cambridge, but did not go into residence. He went to Woolwich with a nomination and obtained his commission in the R.F.A. in May, 1916, and left for the Front almost at once. His battery was in action through the Somme advance last year. He was killed in action on April 2nd.

FROM THE FRONT.

I am now resting a long way behind the trenches in the citadel of Baghdad. The Turks, pursued by our cavalry, have swept on like a whirlwind to no one knows where, and it is pleasant to be far away from the sound of war after all the fighting that has been going on in the last month. You will no doubt have read in the papers about the skilful way in which the Tigris was crossed, and how the Turks were taken unawares and forced to evacuate their trenches. I arrived at the river just after the crossing of the infantry and shall never forget the scene it presented. The Turks were dropping an occasional high explosive on to our

bank, and huge columns of black smoke were shooting upwards with a roar like thunder. Amid a cloud of dust, cavalry horses and transport waggons could be seen galloping ahead on the other bank, with our shells whistling over their heads and dropping among the retreating Turks. And in the midst of all this noise and confusion the Engineers were calmly repairing the pontoon bridge, which had been broken. Soon however the storm subsided, and then the ghastly side of war presented itself in the form of trenches strewn with dead, some half buried, and others, to all appearance, sleeping peacefully in their battered dug-outs, and wrapped round in their blankets.

After this we lost touch with the fighting and found ourselves alone in the jungle on the far side of the Tigris, with 50 waggon-loads of shell, which we had orders to take ahead as quickly as possible.

The next day we were following on six hours behind the enemy, who had littered the Baghdad road with guns, waggons and ammunition. It was then that we had rather an exciting time with Arabs. From what I have seen of these people they are only slightly above animals; they are strong men and splendid riders. I believe they enjoy a skirmish on horse-back. But their motive in attacking either us, or the Turks, is to obtain rifles or whatever may be found on the dead and wounded. In this way there is little distinction between them and the jackals, except that they take a pleasure in mutilating whoever has the misfortune to fall into their hands. We were warned of the presence of them by the sound of intense rifle-fire, and by the approach of an infantryman with a rifle and fixed bayonet. This man breathlessly informed me that a section of his had been surrounded by Arab horsemen, and badly cut up, and that he had managed to escape with a note from his officer. The paper he handed me contained a few hastily written words begging that someone would come to his aid. However we possessed only eight rifles and could do nothing. The rifle fire continued, and soon we came within sight of the Arabs, who were galloping about here and there and firing at random from their horses. There must have been at least a hundred of them, and I could distinctly see their long robes and wild-looking faces. As soon as they noticed us they turned their horses' heads in our direction, and some dismounted and began to open fire at a long range. We continued steadily on without replying, and fortunately, being poor shots, they did no damage. We were beginning to fear that they were about to charge the tail of our column, and, personally, I felt very uncomfortable, as I thought of the number of horses

and mules we had to defend against them. As you can imagine we were considerably relieved when a squadron of mounted artillery appeared and came into action on our flank. It was a fine sight to see the Arab horsemen turn tail and gallop off in column.

We rode for days and days through a very wild and bushy country, and as we neared Ctesiphon I was interested to see some of General Townshend's old trenches, with here and there a human skeleton or two. I was amazed at the size of the Arch of Ctesiphon; it is the largest building I have ever seen. The Turks left huge quantities of guns behind and piles of ammunition. I was interested to see how many direct hits they had received from our artillery. The fact that two of these guns were left behind loaded shows how quickly they had been abandoned.

On our arrival at Baghdad we found the inhabitants very friendly towards us, and apparently glad to exchange us for the Turks, who must have behaved very badly. But the town itself was badly damaged, and an Armenian told me in French that, if we had been half an hour later in capturing it, we should have found it all in ruins.

Baghdad is larger than I expected, and contains a number of beautiful mosques and minarets. The Turks have left behind stacks of rifles and swords in the citadel, together with a quantity of captured material, including about a dozen of General Townshend's guns captured in Kut. Judging by their mutilated appearance, he must have wasted no time in destroying them. Some are cut clean off at the muzzle, although by what means I could not possibly say. A.C.G.

The preliminary bombardment started four days before the actual show, a steady shelling all day and night. We did not hear much of this as we were billeted in some gigantic caves capable of holding 6,000 men. Well, we were in the caves until 9 o'clock on Sunday night. That night we all moved up to the assembly trenches, and there we had a cold and dreary vigil until half-past five on Monday morning, the 9th. We only suffered one casualty in these "jumping off" trenches, in spite of short bursts of shelling from his "whizz-bang" batteries.

At three o'clock it began to rain pretty heavily, which made things most unpleasant; at five o'clock we all partook of our last meal before going over, and my Company Commander and myself consumed two hard-boiled eggs in stony silence. At 5.30 a.m. the Canadians went over the top in front of Vimy Ridge, preceded by

an intense barrage from our field guns and also a liquid fire attack, the most wonderful sight you can possibly imagine.

From where we were in our trenches we could see the Vimy Ridge quite plainly, and, on the stroke of 5.30, two mines went up, which was the signal for our guns to open fire and at the same time let off liquid fire. The Bosche at once sent up every conceivable coloured rocket and alarm signals, green stars, red rockets, lovely golden rain star shells, in fact an exact imitation of a Brock's firework display. This attack took place two hours before ours, which started at 7.34 a.m. The idea was to make him think that our attack was only going to be a feint one, and not on a big scale, and also to deceive him into thinking that our attack would not come off the same day as the Vimy Ridge show.

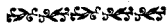
At 7.34 a.m. we went over behind our barrage followed by four Tanks. For the first two hundred yards the going was uphill, and by the time we reached the summit of the Ridge there was not an ounce of wind left in any of the men to do the remaining three hundred yards, and we were also rather disorganised. On coming in sight of the Bosche we were met by machine gun fire and a certain amount of rifle fire, but not much shelling. At one moment things looked rather black, as we came up to our barrage too soon and were compelled to halt for a couple of minutes, during which time we took cover as best we could in shell holes, from which we had a good deal of trouble in getting the men out as soon as the barrage lifted, but we managed to reach our objective, where the Bosche was very ready to give himself up.

The trenches were wiped out of existence, and not a trace of wire, which bears testimony to the marvellous shooting of the Artillery. They came streaming out of their dug-outs by the hundreds, miserable wretches, having been down there without food for the previous two days; in fact an officer came out of a dug-out after we had been there for a couple of hours, calmly smoking a cigar, and was very much astonished to find British Tommies in possession of his sector of the trench. This same officer, seeing an officer in our Company walking towards him, shot him point blank, killing him instantly, and then had the cheek to hold up his hands in surrender. He did not hold them up for long though, being shot dead by the officer's servant. I have related this small incident just to show the true character of the Bosche officers. They are simply out to kill, and, when they have done that, they are satisfied. R.A.F.

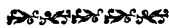

THE CHAPEL.

During the holidays the interior of the Chapel has been greatly improved by a blue linen hanging which has been placed behind the Altar. The Chancel, which previous to this had been somewhat bare, has been very much beautified thereby.

On the outside of the Chapel creepers are being planted. These consist of ampelopsis veitchii on the South side and ivies on the North, together with a few roses on the South. The creepers have been mainly given by members of the School.

The planting of the ground, both sides of the Chapel, with potatoes, which was put into Greaves' hands, was completed early in May. The ground on the North side was roughly levelled last term. Since then it has been ploughed and harrowed, and altogether it is getting into good condition. Rather more than three-quarters of a ton of potatoes have been sown and, if the season is propitious, we may hope for a good crop, the proceeds which should materially benefit the Chapel Fund, particularly as the seed has largely been given.

The Statement of Accounts, which is appended below, shows that since the beginning of February a considerable advance has been made. The deficit at that time was £1032 9s. 10d. Now it is £862 10s. 9d., showing a very satisfactory decrease. But it must be borne in mind that the laying out of the grounds round the Chapel, which is practically com-

pleted now, has not yet been paid for and that this will absorb a considerable sum.

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SCIENTIFIC SOCIETY.

O.G. NEWS.

Major J. S. Noel Harrison, commanding a battalion of the Loyal North Lancashire Regiment, wrote as follows to Mr. Soman regarding the death of his son, L. A. Soman :—

"It is with the deepest regret that I write to you in order to give you the details of your gallant son's death in action during the night of the 9th—10th March, which occurred in the operation of forcing a passage of the River Dialah, eight miles south-east of Baghdad.

"The Battalion had been detailed to cross the river on the night of the 8th March, but, owing to the pontoons being sunk by the enemy's intense machine gun, rifle and shell fire, only one party was able to establish itself on the opposite bank. It was essential to pass over ammunition and a fresh supply of bombs to this party, and attempts were made all the following day to do this, but without success; consequently I asked for volunteers to swim across under cover of darkness, and selected one man out of a number who at once volunteered. It was arranged that your son should pay out the line as the swimmer proceeded, and this he did, but seeing that it had got entangled in a bush near the water's edge, he ran forward to free it, and whilst doing so he was silhouetted against the bank by the light of the moon, and a moment later was shot through the heart by a sniper and died almost immediately, without being able to utter a word.

"For his gallant action, had he lived, I would have recommended him for the Military Cross, for he had previously shown himself to be a brave and capable officer, and, as my Adjutant, I feel his loss very much, and the regret I feel is shared by all ranks, with whom he was most

popular. He was buried where he fell, on the left bank of the Dialah river, about 500 yards from where it joins the River Tigris."

An officer, who was in the same Brigade with him in Mesopotamia for several months, wrote :—

"He was a splendid worker, brave and daring, and always cheerful. He was a man who could turn misery and discontent into happiness and mirth, and was always welcome wherever he went. I am perfectly sure that he was the most popular man in the Brigade."

A brother-officer of G. R. Barratt's wrote :—

"He undoubtedly was one of the most popular officers in the battalion, both with officers and men—his calm, serene disposition made him beloved by all."

The Commander of F. C. Walker's Squadron wrote to Mr. Walker :—

"We all thought very highly of him indeed, and he was certainly one of my most promising pilots. He was a good officer and very keen on his work. Men like him are exceedingly difficult to replace."

A fellow-officer wrote :—

"It appears that, having just taken off the ground, his engine suddenly stopped at a fair height. The machine stalled and got into a spinning nose-dive, and, as he had not sufficient height in which to regain control, it dived straight into the ground at an enormous speed and he was killed immediately. I am sure that we all feel his loss very deeply, as he was certainly one of the most popular officers of the Squadron, and a very good and steady pilot."

The Colonel commanding D. A. Carnegie's Brigade wrote :—

"He was a splendidly gallant fellow, who has done magnificent work always. He could always be absolutely depended upon, and his powers of observation and intuition were exceptional. His reports were always valuable. Everyone, both officers and men, were most awfully fond of him."

The Brigadier-General wrote :—

"I would like you to know the very high opinion in which your son was held in this Divi-

sional Artillery. He was a very rising young officer and his death in action has cut short a most promising military career. During the whole time he was in this Division I have always received the most favourable reports about him as an officer of exceptional value and ability."

One who knew him well here writes :—

"Those who watched David Carnegie at school may have wondered at the measure of his achievement in the different branches of his life. He never appeared to exert himself, yet he became a School Prefect, Captain of his house, a 'first-class' swimmer, and a valued member of various school teams. How was this done by one who had no exceptional gifts, and who neither sought nor desired distinction for himself? It seems somewhat paradoxical until one gives full value to his personality, his determined following of his own line, marked by a true instinct. His apparent diffidence is then seen to be simple modesty, and his success due to well-balanced qualities directed by a resolute will."

Capt. C. G. Graves and Lieut. E. R. Farmer are at the same Camp now at Clausthal, Hartz, Germany.

Capt. H. B. Riggall, who is at present in England, has obtained an exchange into the Indian Army. He hopes to sail very shortly.

Capt. J. L. Head, who has been an observer at the Front for some time, has come home to obtain his pilot's certificate.

P. K. FitzGerald has been appointed Aide-de-Camp to the Governor of Tasmania.

J. H. Carvosso, who is a Lieutenant in Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, has recently been wounded for the fourth time.

F. C. Sutton has been appointed Sub-Manager of a Phenol and Naphthol plant.

H. H. Robinson returned to England early in the year from the Malay States, where he has been serving in the Johore Volunteers. He is now at Lichfield with a Cadet Battalion.

V. L. Walter, who was in Ispahan when war broke out, has just succeeded in getting back to England. He gives some interesting details of his journey :—

"I left Shiraz on January 21st, but, as the road to Bushire was closed owing to robbers, I was obliged to go north. I had 11 days mule caravan to Ispahan, 7 days on a waggon passing through Teheran to Resht on the Caspian, crossing the Caspian by boat to Baku. From there we had a five days' railway journey to Petrograd. There being no passenger sailings from Norway, I was held up in Petrograd for 10 days, and then left by rail to Romanoff, the new Russian Port on the White Sea. I spent a week there on board ship and then left for Naivik in North Norway, where we stopped another six days, taking in iron ore, and then proceeded through the fiords down to Bergen, and crossed from there to the Shetland Islands and so eventually to Middlesbrough, where we arrived on April 7th—77 days travelling!"

L. F. St. J. Davies, who is in the Motor Machine-Gun Corps, is attached to a Cavalry Regiment and hopes to go out to France shortly.
